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Tangmere Military Aviation Museum and Model Flying Day 25th September

The Day started fine with a gentle breeze from the South West with most of the crew on site well before 9am, all busy setting up the site erecting the flight control tent, crowd control barriers and the PA (Supplied by Ken Gale of Helipad) etc.

There was a fine turnout of models of approximately fifty aircraft of which approx. 50% where flown. We also had contributions from flyers from other clubs , Steve Warren (Waltham Chase) who flew his Gas Turbine powered Boomerang with great aplomb, Terry Weeks (Aldershot) who flew two of his state-of-the-art composite electric powered thermal gliders, Tony Butterworth (SABMFA Area Chairman) flew a ducted fan Grumman scale jet, Ken Gale (Helipad) along with Dion Hoare and Dave Houghton who flew scale Helicopters and Peter Turley (Petersfield) manned the BMFA tent.. Finishing and painting models By Geoff Ashford

Geoff had been chatting to Bruce Smith about the painting of a Mosquito he has been building, Bruce had suggested that he submitted an article for CD. Here is Geoff's article.....

The Mosquito I am building is a photo recognisance version and as such has a defined colour which I believe is to BS 5036. However I could not find this reference in my colour swatch. I did however have a sample colour. To try and match colours at Halfords and the like is difficult and their products are fairly costly. I have found in the past that a good finish can be obtained with Acrylic paint and the best known is Emulsion paint as used in household decoration. I have discovered that Homebase have a colour reader which is like a pin-point torch that is placed directly on the sample. Low and behold after a very short time it spits out the quantities of pigment that have to be added to a white base material. This is all done within the machine. As you know models do not need too much paint or they will become heavy, it is possible to have a sample tin of 250mls made up for which the charge is about £3 or less. This I use to spray the model after I have added Satin Varnish (Acrylic). One part colour, two parts Varnish and a very small amount of water to help it through my mini airbrush sprayer. Several coats are needed with a dry rub down between coats to fill some of the in perfections. The Varnish is the more costly item but my total outlay for decorating is less than £10.

Decoration is a matter of considerable devotion to preparation; the Mosquito has been finished with tissue and still needs more refinement whereas my Catalina which has a glass finish looks superb by comparison.

The ultimate joy is that you clean up with water and you can easily clean you hands with a Scotch pad. (it doesn't even need soap!)'

Geoff went on to write:

None have flown yet, mainly because I cannot attend to them before flight. I have been offered help by Mick. Blundell but we do not seem to be able to get together yet. It will happen sometime but it is important that they are checked over by an expert before they appear on the patch which will probably have to be Thorney in order to have enough landing approach.

Since the photo session with the Cat. there has been a disaster with one of the uc servos which is buried deep in the hull. I am carving into the pylon to try and get at it but I fear more major surgery will be needed. It now becomes a winter project.

Something for me to look forward to after my return from holiday in October. All the best with CD. I will follow it in France on my laptop.

SCALE COMP 2011 Saturday 15th October

Bruce has asked me include this in this months CD

As you'll see from CD and the Website, the scale comp will soon be upon us. Weather permitting, we'll be running it from 12.00 noon, Saturday 15th October on the Thorney Island site.

This is only a stand-off scale event so you don't need to bring a masterpiece, you can use ARTF models and there's no static judging BUT Please let's try to keep to the spirit of scale flying - we don't want the super aerobatic scale ARTFs. Most of us have Cap's, Edge's, Sukhoi's, Extra's, Yak's etc. Ray has already run a successful competition for these marques.

What we want are the kind of scale models that are more difficult to fly and we want to see them fly like their prototypes do - and not like 3D aces.

We'll be working loosely to the 2011 BMFA Scale rules found between pages 58 - 86 of file:

http://www.bmfa.org/publications/rulebooks/files/Ru11-sca.pdf [You can save this to your PC/MAC.]

Here you can see what the various manoeuvre options are, and how the judges expect to see them flown. You'll need to choose 8 of these manoeuvres in any order of your choice but you must include the straight and level flight, the figure of eight and the descending circle. Obviously, the Take-off (No. 1) and the Landing (No. 10) are also obligatory.

Print off two copies of the judges scoring sheet (page 96) and bring them to the comp. These should be filled in with yours and your models details. Put the numbers 2 to 9 in the first column against the appropriate manoeuvres which you've chosen to perform.

You'll need someone to call for you (remind you what you're doing next) while you're flying (and to remind you to call NOW and FINISHED with each manoeuvre) so to help, I've attached the file of a simple Flying Schedule Sheet as an aide memoir.

PLEASE, PLEASE, PLEASE, PLEASE try and get down on the field early so that you've put your model together and run the engine up well before 11.30am. Then we can have half an hour for practice and model trimming to try and get the comp off the ground for 12.00 noon.
